
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

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# Kingsley Elementary Students Out-Reads 26 County Schools to Win TADL Summer Reading Championship



Our Kingsley Stags are readers and leaders!

At the October 14 Board of Education meeting, the Traverse Area District Library presented Kingsley Elementary with the Summer Reading Club 2024 championship banner.

The Summer Reading Club challenges readers across the county to log their reading minutes to earn prizes and foster a love of reading.

Of all 26 elementary schools in Grand Traverse County, Kingsley had the highest percentage of students who participated and read at least 600 minutes over 6 weeks.

- 665 students participated in the program, up 10% from the summer of 2023. 115 of them were pre-readers, aged 0-5 years old.
- More than a third of all readers achieved or surpassed the 600-minute goal.

The Kingsley Branch Library would like to thank the students for their diligence; school librarian Wendy Sterk for instilling a love of libraries and encouraging them to continue reading through the summer; and especially the teachers and staff who promoted the program in a myriad of ways!

On Friday, October 4, Kingsley Area Schools was proud to welcome the Michigan Department of Education Teacher of the Year, Kelley Cusmano, for a tour of the district. Kingsley is the first of nine stops the Rochester High English teacher will make across the state.

Cusmano is touring the districts of the other nine 24-25 Regional Teacher of the Year honorees. Today, she was guided by Kingsley Elementary's third-grade teacher, Molly Dunham, the Region 2 Teacher of the Year.

"As a regional Teacher of the Year honoree, I'm really excited to share the good things we're doing here in Kingsley," said Dunham.

As honorees, Dunham and Cusmano are representing the voice of teachers statewide as they work directly with the Department of Education to solve Michigan's most pressing educational issues.

Their day began before the school bell even rang, as Dunham and Cusmano greeted enthusiastic elementary students as they arrived. The two educators spent the day immersed in classrooms, observing and celebrating the learning happening within the district.

Cusmano says her first impression of the district is how strong the community ties are.

"I've just noticed so much Kingsley pride with all of the signs and their S.T.A.G acronym posted everywhere [Safe, Trustworthy, Acts Responsibly, Gives Respect]," said Cusmano. "I could see the community pride from the minute I walked in the door."

The 2024-2025 Teacher of the Year says she hopes these tours and experiences will help inform her ahead of state and national meetings with education stakeholders.

"I want to be able to talk about districts other than my own when I'm at the table in discussions with the Department of Education. I want to be able to have experiences from Michigan schools to connect the dots so to speak when it comes to statewide initiatives," said Cusmano.

"Here in Kingsley, there's been some rock star teachers doing some really cool work."

## KHS' Carolyn Wolf Takes the Podium at National Retired Racehorse Competition



This fall, KHS junior Carolyn Wolf competed in the Retired Racehorse Project Thoroughbred Makeover National Championships competition in Lexington, Kentucky.

The national competition tasks trainers from all over North America to train and compete with horses who have recently retired from the race track. The event, hosted at the Kentucky Horse Park, is the largest event of its kind and attracted 396 competitors this year.

Carolyn acquired her racehorses from Monmouth Park race track in New Jersey in September of last year. Carolyn spent more than a year training her two retired racehorses, teaching them how to compete in dressage and show jumping. She competed in the junior division and earned second place in dressage with her horse Antonov and third in show jumping with Royal Urn. Overall, she placed 28th out of 101 dressage riders, most of which were professionals.

"What was most exciting was seeing all the hard work pay off, because these are horses that I've trained myself," said Carolyn. "They're like my kids, I'm constantly worrying about them, and caring for them. It consumes my life. They give me more of their heart when we go out there to compete, and that's really cool."

Growing up in Kingsley, Carolyn's passion for horses started when she was in second grade and joined The United States Pony Club. She's been active in the equestrian community for more than ten years and travels to state competitions on the weekend and national competitions in the summer. She has even trained under Olympic rider, Boyd Martin.

"It would be awesome to go to the Olympics one day," said Carolyn. "I don't know what will happen, but when you put the hard work in, it does all come together."


#### Chase Bott




#### **Elementary Launches S.T.A.G Initiative**
